

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TANDEMS partners meet climate activist

Madeleine Alisa Wörner, a climate activist from Germany, recently visited Gabrovo. She brought a breath of fresh air and change to one of our Bulgarian partner cities, having just come from COP29 in Baku. Wörner, a leading figure in the climate protection movement, engaged in constructive dialogue with local stakeholders and left a lasting impression on the community.

Her visit and stopover followed one of the roughest stages of her trip so far. The day before, she called to say she would make it in time, despite the heavy snow. She was convinced she could make it – and she did. The day after, we met Madeleine at the Municipality of Gabrovo, Bulgaria. Vanya Lazarova and Todor Popov seized the chance to discuss the challenges and opportunities of a sustainable future, free from coal and pollution.

Bulgaria at COP29: A Mixed Bag of Progress and Setbacks

Bulgaria's participation in COP29 reflects a complex picture of progress and setbacks in its climate action journey. However, the country is determined to make progress on climate action. The delayed coal phase-out pushed back to 2038, is one of the most significant challenges hindering the country's ability to meet its climate targets and contribute to continued reliance on a polluting energy source. The expansion of renewable energy is hindered by legislation and regulatory frameworks that create obstacles, including issues like grid connection, permitting processes, and support mechanisms for renewable energy projects.

However, Bulgaria has also made significant progress in renewable energy development, particularly in solar and wind power. Efforts are also underway to improve energy efficiency in buildings and across various sectors - and Gabrovo is one of the cities in the region that has committed itself to making this transition towards renewable and green energies as soon as possible. TANDEMS and other EU-funded projects have proved to be important vehicles supporting the implementation of their ambitious ideas.

COP in a nutshell

The Conference of the Parties (COP) is the annual meeting of the nations that have signed the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). This global conference brings together representatives from nearly 200 countries to address the urgent challenge of climate change.

COP negotiations have achieved successes like the Paris Agreement, but global emissions continue to rise. Many major emitters have failed to meet their commitments, undermining the agreement's goals. While adaptation strategies are being developed, funding remains inadequate, and developed countries have not fully delivered promised financial support to developing nations.

Discussing the role of energy communities in climate change

Wörner's visit to Gabrovo was more than just a chance for inspiration; it was also an opportunity to discuss the role of energy communities in engaging citizens in the mission of municipalities. In addition to reducing dependence on non-local energy sources, energy communities have a special role to play in making the energy transition fairer and more equitable. With the municipality itself joining and facilitating the energy community at the site of the local landfill, there are new opportunities to reduce the cost of running public buildings: a win-win situation.

By linking up with climate activist Madeleine Wörner, whose bike ride is both a physical and symbolic challenge, Gabrovo's energy initiative has gained international visibility. Together, Wörner and our local TANDEMS partners also managed to link local efforts to the global negotiations at COP29, proving that the fight against climate change is not something they do alone, but together with others and across borders. In this sense, their journey can be read as a cartography of hope. It is built one pedal stroke at a time.



Empowering Local Initiatives: Open Collaboration Model





Download the Open Collaboration Model Guidelines from the TANDEMS website The TANDEMS Open Collaboration Model (OCM) is a practical guide designed by TANDEMS partner VITO to assist teams of pioneers in developing, designing, and implementing value networks for local energy initiatives. By focusing on the collaboration between local authorities and energy communities, the OCM aims to create shared, multiple, and collective value for the community.

The OCM guides teams through a four-step process:

- 1. Discover: Analyze the local context and identify existing strengths, resources, and opportunities.
- 2.Dream: Envision an ideal future for the energy initiative and define shared values and goals.
- 3.Design: Develop concrete plans and strategies, including defining roles, allocating resources, and establishing collaboration mechanisms.
- 4.Deliver: Implement the plans, mobilize resources, and work with partners to achieve tangible results.

By following these steps, teams can create sustainable and impactful energy initiatives that benefit the entire community. The OCM emphasizes the importance of collaboration, shared value creation, and community empowerment.
